Waring School Supports an Alumnus



In addition to welcoming Taktse teachers to observe classes, Waring School Headmaster Peter Smick also took the time to discuss the inner operations of a small school with his former student, Pintso Denjongpa, now principal of Taktse School. Inspired by the difference Waring made in his own life, Pintso has implemented certain aspects of Waring's unique culture at Taktse, including sketching during field trips and older students teaching younger ones.

Two years ago Waring teacher Jim Watras journeyed to Taktse. He taught poetry and introduced Taktse teachers to the educational philosophy of Parker Palmer. Jim hopes to lead a student exchange between Waring and Taktse, so Waring students can learn about Himalayan culture and problems of developing countries, and Taktse students can learn about American culture, and problems the U.S. faces.



Writer and Artist Visit Taktse

Renowned children's book author Anushka Ravishankar travelled to Taktse from her home in Chennai and spent a week giving writing workshops for our students and teachers. When teachers mentioned to Ms. Ravishankar that they wished there were picture books featuring Himalayan kids, she encouraged us all to write our own.

Serendipitously, Kyujin Lee, artist and art teacher at St. Patrick's School in Washington, D.C. arrived at our small guest house in Chanbari at the same time that Ms.



Ravishankar was visiting! Ms. Lee taught our students and teachers new ways to look at art, and use five elements of art to create their own. Everyone noticed a huge difference in our students' paintings after her visit.

Hopefully, the two will come again, and some children's books set in Sikkim will result!

Fine Schools in India Welcome Taktse

Many schools in India have generously hosted our teachers, principal and board. The principals and teachers of these fine schools have given us crucial support by sharing their knowledge and the wisdom of their own experience, as we set down roots. They
